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The Elixier of Love

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Aloha kākou!

It is my pleasure to welcome you to the second production in your Hawai'i Opera Theatre's 2022/2023 Season as we continue our exploration of the lighter side of opera. After nearly three years living through a pandemic, I felt we all needed a break from the heavy – but oh so glorious – tragic operas that have served as the core of our repertoire over our 60+ year history in Hawai'i.

The Elixir of Love is one of my very favorite operas. In fact, I've directed the opera multiple times over the years. Two of those productions were for Pocket Opera, a wonderful little company based in San Francisco, using the English translation we're using at HOT for our production. Pocket Opera was founded by pianist Donald Pippin in 1978, and he served as its artistic director until his death in 2021 at the age of 96. His mission was to make opera more accessible by performing everything in English, utilizing his own clever translations, and stripping away the trappings of grand opera to make it more intimate and affordable. Over his time, Donald translated over 90 operas, many of which have been used by professional opera companies around the world. He also led the "Pocket Philharmonic" from the keyboard and narrated every single performance until the last couple years of his life.

Donald was the first to engage me as a professional singer, and later as a director, and I will be forever in his debt. I was involved in dozens of productions with Pocket Opera over the course of 20+ years, as singer, director, and a few times, both (which I do not recommend...). More than any other mentor, he taught me the power of words in opera. His translations were meticulous and well thought out, and for me *Elixir* is his very best. I hope you enjoy it as much as I do, especially in our gorgeous new production which sets the action right here in our beautiful Hawaiian home.

The opera opens on a contemporary village in Hawai'i coming to life. Nemorino, a poor young maintenance employee at the sugarcane farm, is madly in love with the successful owner and manager, Adina. Nemorino thinks she is beyond his reach, but she is also in love with him. She teases him and tells the story of how Tristan won the heart of Isolde by drinking a magic love potion.

A military regiment arrives, led by the pompous Sergeant Belcore, who immediately introduces himself to Adina and asks her to marry him. Adina promises to consider Belcore's offer, pushing Nemorino to confess his feelings. Left alone with Nemorino, Adina tries to provoke him to action by asserting that his time would be better spent in town looking after his sick uncle rather than hoping to win her love.

Dr. Dulcamara, a traveling "Doctor Feelgood," arrives to promote an elixir capable of curing anything. A hopeful Nemorino asks if the doctor has anything like the love potion in Adina's book. Dulcamara claims he does, attaching a fake label to a bottle of cheap wine. He explains that

Synopsis

Nemorino will have to wait until the next day to see the results... just enough time for the doctor to make a clean exit. Nemorino buys the bottle - conveniently priced at the amount in his pocket - and immediately drinks it. As the wine takes effect, he becomes sure that he will be irresistible to Adina by tomorrow, so he feigns cheerful indifference toward her. Infuriated, Adina retaliates by flirting with Belcore. When urgent orders arrive for the sergeant to return to his garrison, Adina agrees to marry him at once. The shocked Nemorino begs her to wait one more day, but she dismisses him. Instead, she invites the entire village to her banquet. Desperate, Nemorino can only seek out Dulcamara for more help.

ACT II

As the curtain opens, the townspeople are preparing to celebrate the wedding. Adina wonders why Nemorino isn't there, as she doesn't want to sign the marriage contract until he appears. Nemorino finds Dulcamara and pleads for another bottle of the elixir, but no money means no help. Belcore wanders in, bewildered that Adina continues to delay the wedding. When Nemorino expresses his desperate need for cash, the sergeant figures he can get a rival suitor out of the way by persuading him to join the army for the enlistment bonus.

With his new elixir in hand, Nemorino suddenly finds himself besieged by a group of women. Nemorino believes the elixir is finally taking effect. What he doesn't realize – but the women do – is that his uncle has recently passed away, leaving him with a sizable inheritance. Adina feels responsible for Nemorino's enlistment, but her concern turns to jealousy when she sees him with the other women. Dulcamara boasts about the power of his elixir and offers to sell some to Adina, but she is confident in her ability to win Nemorino on her own. Not surprisingly, love wins in the end.

Keeping it Local

What do you think of when you think of Hawai'i?

Opera probably isn't the first thing that comes to mind, but with a show involving over fifty kama'aina from costume design to set build and chorus, it just might. But it doesn't stop there. The set for *Elixir* was built in HOT's Waipahu scene shop, and it was our first production in over 15 years that was both designed and built locally.

Months ago, HOT's design team toured Hawai'i Plantation Villages for inspiration

and historical background. "We wanted to explore the island of O'ahu and create an authentic, Hawai'icentered set. With this show taking place in a fictional quaint town outside a sugarcane farm, Hawaiis PLANTATION VILLAGE

we knew a good place to start would be Hawai'i Plantation Villages," said HOT Scenic Designer Michelle Bisbee. We hope to have many more projects like this one that utilize our amazing local resources so that when people think of Hawai'i, opera isn't too far behind.

Director's Notes

HOT's invitation to direct this unique custom-made production of *The Elixir of Love* fulfills an artistic dream of mine.

I was grateful that Andrew and his team encouraged and trusted my vision to set this opera in Hawai'i, using the background of a sugarcane farm (alluding to the traditional magic of Hawaiian "Hana Aloha"). My goal in changing the setting was to have this piece reach the hearts of its community by reflecting Hawai'i.

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Conductor's Note

The movie *Senso* opens with a scene at the famous Teatro La Fenice in Venice. The stuffy theater is packed with a cross section of Venetian society; the opera itself a backdrop for a vivid meeting of people of all kinds, gossiping, protesting, falling in love.

If you were in the audience of the premiere of *this* opera in 1832, you'd have likely found yourself in a similarly chaotic scene. You wouldn't be reading a note from the conductor, because there wasn't one. Performances were shaped by singers and orchestra musicians without such a character, and so communication was key for everyone involved. Expectations were high, and audiences and critics were as savage in their disapproval as much as they cheered successes.

••• ... the theater remains a place where we are still compelled to mix it up....?

While we are a long way away from 1832, I like remembering that the theater remains a place where we are still compelled to mix it up as a group and communicate to each other, as performers, as an audience, as a group of people coming together. And while we may not achieve the particular intensity of that time, we should certainly aspire to its enthusiasm for the people we come across in the theater and what they mean in our lives.

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
